writing the 9 11 decade investigates the relation of the novel to reportage and the role of both in shaping culture by looking at novelists journalistic responses

to the september 11 attacks journalist and academic charlie lee potter argues that novelists were entrapped by the expectation that they would provide an immediate non fiction response to 9 11 beginning with an examination of the sometimes mawkish writing that emerged in the days after the attacks writing the 9 11 decade traces the evolution of literary journalism in writers such as ian mcewan paul auster don delillo mohsin hamid and nadeem aslam into new methods of subsuming the disaster while attempting to stand apart from it it includes interviews with novelists such as richard ford amy waldman and kamila shamsie as well as the only longform interview granted by the former archbishop of canterbury dr rowan williams who is himself a 9 11 survivor in assessing the novel s capacity to respond to and contain an unimagined traumatic event writing the 9 11 decade stands as a contemporary history of the form

writer identity and the teaching and learning of writing is a groundbreaking book which addresses what it really means to identify as a writer in educational contexts and the implications for writing pedagogy it conceptualises writers identities and draws upon empirical studies to explore their construction enactment and performance focusing largely on teachers identities and practices as writers and the writer identities of primary and secondary students it also encompasses the perspectives of professional writers and highlights promising new directions for research with four interlinked sections this book offers nuanced understandings of how writer identities are shaped and formed insights into how classroom practice changes when teachers position themselves as writers alongside their students new understandings of what this positioning means for students identities as writers and writing pedagogy and illuminating case studies mapping young people s writing trajectories with an international team of contributors the book offers a global perspective on this vital topic and makes a new and strongly theorised contribution to the field viewing writer identity as fluid and multifaceted this book is important reading for practising teachers student teachers educational researchers and practitioners currently undertaking postgraduate studies contributors include teresa cremin terry locke sally baker josephine brady diane collier nikolaj elf ian eyres theresa lillis marilyn mckinney denise morgan debra myhill mary ryan kristin stang chris street anne whitney and rebecca woodard

a deaf take on non equivalence in written chinese translation examines the issue of lexical non equivalence between written chinese and hong kong sign language hksl translation describing its theoretical and practical implications this research foregrounds the semiotic resources in the deaf community of hong kong by analyzing translation strategies exhibited by deaf hongkongers when they were invited to translate written chinese passages with specialized and culturally specific concepts in a monologic setting with discourse analysis as a framework the major findings of this research were that 1 a taxonomy of strategies featured depiction manual representations of chinese characters and visual metonymy writing and mouthing 2 employment of multisemiotic and

multimodal resources gave intended viewers access to different facets of meaning and 3 repeated renditions of the same concepts gave rise to condensed abbreviated occasionalisms observations from this research serve as a point of reference for interpreting scholars practitioners and students as well as policymakers who formulate interpretation service provision and assessment
